
How to care for our fabrics and curtains

To ensure our fabrics and curtains stay in excellent condition for as long as possible, it is important to follow the care instructions and a few good cleaning practices.

Here are our tips to guide you through the process.

Our care instructions

Make sure to refer to our maintenance instructions before cleaning your products. You can find the care symbols for all of our textiles on the back of the sample board and on the product sheets in our fabric library:



Care instructions: symbol guide

MACHINE WASH

The tub symbol represents the first stage of caring for fabrics: washing. The numbers within the tub indicate the maximum wash temperature in degrees Celsius. If there is a line below the symbol, specific precautions must be observed, which are generally mentioned beside the care instructions.

DO NOT WASH

A cross means that the item cannot be washed.

NOTE: a horizontal line under the tub means a more delicate cycle should be used.

△ BLEACH

Indicates whether chlorine- or oxygen-based bleaching products can be used.



A cross means that the items cannot be bleached or treated for stains with chlorinebased products (such as bleach) or those containing oxygenated bleaching agents.

We recommend using only detergents without bleaching agents for our fabrics.

TUMBI F DRY


This symbol indicates the tumble dryer A cross means that it should not be tumble temperature settings: 1 dot for low heat. 2 dots for medium heat.

DO NOT TUMBLE DRY

A A A IRON

This symbol indicates the maximum iron temperature you should use: 1 dot for a low temperature, 2 dots for a medium temperature, or 3 dots for a high temperature.



A cross means that it should not be ironed.

PROFESSIONAL CLEANING

This symbol is intended primarily for cleaning professionals. The letters inside the circle (P, F or W) indicate the types of processes and solvents that can be used on the textiles. For example:

- indicates the following authorised solvents: perchloroethylene and hydrocarbons.
- indicates the following authorised solvents: hydrocarbons only.
- indicates professional cleaning with water, an ecological and effective way to care for textiles.

- A line under the symbol indicates that specific precautions are necessary.
- A cross means that dry-cleaning is prohibited.

Unlike dry-cleaning, which uses chemical solvents such as perchloroethylene, this technique uses water and specially formulated chemicals to protect fabrics while removing dirt. This process is becoming increasingly popular with professional dry-cleaners.

Ready-made curtains

Curtains require special care. Here are a few key points:



-Avoid calendar ironing to prevent the curtains from becoming misshapen and to prevent damage to the headings and the various curtain hanging systems.

-Fill your washing machine accordingly: if it is overloaded, fabrics may be crushed, causing permanent lines to form on them. Depending on the type of item you are washing, we recommend only half filling the washing machine, for example, blackout fabric is more likely to tear than sheer curtains.

-We strongly recommend **removing all removable hanging systems** before washing curtains, to avoid the risk of snagging and pulls.

-We recommend using a steamer to remove any creases once you have hung

your curtains (back) up. Before using any type of steamer, it is best to test a small, non-visible part of the item to ensure that the steam does not affect the appearance of your curtains. When using this type of appliance, it is essential to comply with the ironing temperatures given in the care instructions.

Spot treatment

It is impossible to establish specific stain removal rules as each stain is different. Before trying to remove a stain, it's important to identify what caused it so you can choose the right stain remover. We recommend that you carry out a test on a small, inconspicuous part of the item before using any type of stain remover, to ensure that it will not damage the item. If necessary, call in a professional cleaning service specialising in the treatment of curtains and decorative textile items.



Tip: if possible, don't allow fresh stains to dry out. It is easier to remove a stain that has not had time to dry, as it has not yet had time to set in and cause lasting damage to the fibres.
